

Communication from the Secretary-General to the representatives of Member States (updated version 9 February 2024)

- This document provides information on the situation in the Red Sea region as at 9 February 2024. This is a revised version of the document of 26 January 2024. It has been prepared by the IMO Secretariat and is addressed to the contact points of the Member States registered in GISIS. - 2 Since 19 November 2023, the IMO Secretariat has recorded 27 incidents, including acts of piracy against international shipping vessels transiting the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden.

These attacks concerned the following types of vessels:

- 1 Crude Oil Tanker
- 1 Ro-Ro Cargo
- 3 Tanker
- 4 Chemical tankers
- 6 Bulk Carrier
- 11 Container Ship
- 1 General Cargo

The flags of these ships were as follows:

The distribution of these incidents over time is as follows:

- November 2023: 2
- December 2023: 16
- January 2024: 7
- February (until 9 February) 2024: 2
- 3 On 3 January 2024, the Secretary-General briefed the Security Council on the situation in the Red Sea. On 10 January 2024, the Security Council adopted Resolution S/RES/2722(2024).



- 4 On 15 January 2024, the Secretary-General met the signatory states of the Djibouti Code of Conduct. The meeting provided an opportunity to review activities and the need to finalize the action plan¹.
- On 16 January 2024, the Secretary-General met the First Sea Lord and Chief of the Naval Staff of the British Royal Navy. On this occasion the Secretary-General reiterated the importance of protecting seafarers and preserving freedom of navigation as mentioned in Security Council Resolution S/RES/2722(2024) and stressed the need for de-escalation.
- On 18 January 2024, the Secretary-General met industry representatives. Participants highlighted the key focus on the safety of seafarers and freedom of navigation. The meeting also highlighted the issue of fuel availability for ships utilizing the Cape of Good Hope route, and the need to work on a revision of the guidelines pertaining to countering piracy.
- On 2 February 2024, the Secretary-General met representatives of the States involved in "Operation Prosperity Guardian" underscoring the paramount importance of protecting seafarers' lives. He continued to call for the de-escalation of tensions and the freedom of navigation of ships in the area.
- 8 On 9 February 2024, the Secretary-General met representatives of EU Member States involved in "Operation EUNAVFOR ASPIDES" underscoring the paramount importance of protecting seafarers' lives. He also underlined the importance of supporting the action plans of the Member States of the Djibouti Code of Conduct.
